Cleveland, Ohio (August 12, 2008) — What do Superman, Batman, Green Lantern, The Spirit, Captain Marvel and The Hulk all have in common? If you said they have alter egos, look good in spandex, and helped shape American values, you're right.

More importantly, the creators of the original superheroes were predominantly Jewish, as were the comic book publishers of that era, and their characters became beloved symbols of human potential and the triumph of good over evil. While most were from New York, the boys who dreamed up Superman hailed from the Glenville neighborhood in Cleveland, Ohio.

Step into the Maltz Museum September 16, 2008 – January 4, 2009 and you'll be enveloped in an entertaining and illuminating world, at once a nostalgic look at the origins of the still-vibrant superhero genre and a glimpse into the 'story behind the story' – their invention as America recovered from the Depression and entered World War II.

"This is one of our most entertaining exhibitions yet," comments Judi Feniger, Executive Director. "It has something for everyone – history, drama, adventure. Kids will have a blast trying on costumes, drawing in the Comic Studio and riding the Batmobile while their parents and grandparents can relive the thrill of sneaking off to the movies to see serials and hiding comics under the covers after lights out."

Zap! Pow! Bam! The Superhero includes vintage artwork, rare early comic books, scripts, multi-media presentations, original toys and games, videotaped conversations with some of the leading comic book creators of their time, and colorful interactive displays. Through never-before exhibited art and objects culled from private and institutional collections, the exhibition explores the genesis of these important cultural icons and how they shaped popular opinion, then and now. A season-long offering of public programs delves further into issues like gender and racial stereotyping in the comics and how a comic is created.

"There is great pop culture history here," notes Feniger, "wonderful vintage pins, puzzles, games and toys, scripts and postcards. One of my favorites is the first concept sketch of The Joker from the *Batman* series. When I think of The Joker, I picture the film version played by Jack Nicholson, and now we have Heath Ledger's performance in *The Dark Knight* – but the original was from a much simpler time."

The Maltz Museum of Jewish Heritage is at 2929 Richmond Road, Beachwood, Ohio, 44122, online at www.MaltzJewishMuseum.org. Docent-led tours of the Permanent Collection and this Special Exhibition are available. The Museum Store carries Superman items year-round, and, during this exhibition, a wide range of colorful and kitschy superhero-themed merchandise.

Quick Facts

Background

- Developed by The William Breman Jewish Heritage Museum, Atlanta, Georgia. Guest Curator Jerry Robinson (who, when working with Batman creator Bob Kane, named Batman's young protégé Robin and co-created Batman's nemesis, The Joker).
- During the Golden Age of Comic Books, superheroes took on the role of repairing the world, their exploits reflecting the issues of the time.
- In the midst of economic and political turmoil, these comic books brought not only entertainment, but also hope and pride through the champions who would shape the values of an entire generation.
- The writers and illustrators who created the majority of the original superheroes were Jewish. *Zap!* educates visitors on prejudice and societal restrictions put upon Jews in the 1930s and 1940s, and provides insight into the role of the superhero, whose alter ego was an ordinary person.

Exhibition Features

- An immersive, interactive world of superheroes, illuminating the creative processes that drove their originators to conceive America's timeless icons including Superman, Batman, Captain America and Wonder Woman.
- More than 70 never-before-displayed comic books and memorabilia, including items from Jerry Robinson's personal collection.
- A theater showing 1940s serials.
- Video interviews of legends Will Eisner (the 'father of the graphic novel', creator of The Spirit), Bob Kane (co-creator of Batman), Jack Kirby (co-creator of Captain America), Stan Lee (co-creator of Spider-Man), Jerry Robinson, Jules Schwartz (editor of *Green Lantern*) and others.
- An original, working, collector-edition child-sized Batmobile ride, vintage interactive phone booth, a comic drawing studio, child-sized costumes that kids can wear, Kryptonite and more.
- Clothing that belonged to Superman co-creators Jerry Siegel and Joe Shuster, and several facsimiles of their original drawings.





Things you never read in the Funny Papers

The creators of most of the Golden Age comic superheroes were Jewish

- Will Eisner 'the father of the graphic novel'; creator of The Spirit
- Bill Finger best known as the uncredited co-creator, with Bob Kane, of Batman
- **Bob Kane** (born Robert Kahn) creator of Batman
- **Jack Kirby** (born Jacob Kurtzberg) co-creator of Captain America, The Hulk, Fantastic Four, X-Men, The Fly and many others
- **Stan Lee** (born Stanley Lieber) -co-creator of Spider-Man, Fantastic Four, X-Men, Iron Man and others
- **Jerry Robinson** named Batman's sidekick Robin; claims to have created The Joker, though that is disputed
- **Joe Shuster** co-creator of Superman
- Jerry Siegel co-creator of Superman
- Joe Simon co-creator of Captain America, Newsboy Legion and The Fly

Most of the Golden Age creators were from New York, often products of high schools with refugee teachers fleeing Nazi persecution on their faculties. Superman's creators Jerry Siegel and Joe Shuster were a major exception.

Northeast Ohio has boasted a wealth of cartoon and comic strip talent, including:

- **Tony Auth** (born 1942, Akron) is a Pulitzer-prize winning editorial cartoonist for *The Philadelphia Enquirer*.
- **Tom Batiuk** (born 1947, Akron) is best known for the syndicated strips *Funky Winkerbean* (first appeared in print in 1972) and *Crankshaft* (began syndication in 1987). He is a graduate of Kent State University, and lives in Medina.
- **Robert Crumb aka R. Crumb** (born 1943; moved to Cleveland in the early 1960s) is best known for his *Keep on Truckin'* comic and the characters *Fritz the Cat* and *Mr. Natural*, and worked at American Greetings.
- **Jordon Gorfinkle**, a DC Comics editor for more than a decade, is best known in the Jewish community for *Everything's Relative* which is published internationally since 1996. He lives in University Heights.
- Ed Kuekes (1901 1987) was a cartoonist and comic artist who studied at Baldwin-Wallace College and the Cleveland Institute of Art and worked at the *Cleveland Plain Dealer* from 1922 until 1966.

- Charles Macauley (born 1871, Canton 1934) drew his first cartoons for the *Canton Repository* before winning a \$50 prize from the *Cleveland Press* in 1892. He won a Pulitzer Prize for his cartooning in 1930.
- Raymond Harold Osrin (1928-2001) was an award-winning editorial cartoonist who moved to Cleveland in 1963 to work for *The Plain Dealer*, where he remained until his retirement in 1993. He donated collections of his cartoons to Cleveland State University and to the Cartoon Research Library at the Ohio State University.
- **Harvey Pekar** (born 1939, Cleveland) is best known for his autobiographical *American Splendor* series that documents daily life in the aging neighborhoods of Cleveland, where he worked throughout his life as a file clerk in the Veteran's Administration hospital. He lives in Cleveland.
- Arthur B. "Art" Sansom (born 1920, East Cleveland 1991) created *The Born Loser* in 1965. His son, Arthur "Chip" Sansom graduated Case Western Reserve University, began to assist his father in the 1980s, and now lives in Lakewood.
- **Jerry Siegel** (born 1914, Cleveland 1996) **and Joe Shuster** (born 1914 Toronto, moved to Cleveland 1992) were friends at Glenville High School when they began the collaboration that would result in America's first superhero, Superman.
- **Bill Watterson** (born 1958, Washington, D.C.; moved to Chagrin Falls at age 6, where he still lives) is the author of *Calvin and Hobbes*, published 1985 1995.

There are Ohio ties to many other renowned cartoonists, including:

- **Jim Borgman** (born 1954, Cincinnati, attended Kenyon College), is a political cartoonist whose work is nationally syndicated and has won a Pulitzer Prize.
- Tony Cochran, creator of the worldwide syndicated *Agnes*, lives in Columbus.
- Cathy Guisewite (born 1950, Dayton) created the nationally syndicated *Cathy*.
- **Walt Handlesman** (attended University of Cincinnati) is a Pulitzer Prizewinning and nationally syndicated editorial cartoonist for *Newsday*.
- **Richard Felton Outcault** (born 1863, Lancaster, Ohio) created "Hogan's Alley" starring "Yellow Kid", generally acknowledged as the first newspaper comic strip.
- **Mike Peters** draws syndicated cartoons that appear around the US, including *Mother Goose and Grimm*, and has won the Pulitzer Prize for cartooning. His home paper is the *Dayton Daily News*.
- **Jeff Smith**, based in Columbus, created *Bone*, selected by *Time Magazine* in 1995 as one of the ten greatest graphic novels of all time.


