His body was found in garbage bags at a waste management recycling center. This sickened me because I have two nephews around this baby's age and I couldn't fathom the thought of them ever being harmed in any way. I thought to myself, "Who would do this to an innocent baby?" It was then that I knew that we needed to make a difference...and soon.

This last act hurt me as much as the case of the three year old. It was the murder of an 18 year old male. He was walking down the street when a car pulled up beside him and shot him. It hurts me even more because of the fact that he had two children. Now two babies would grow up without a father, not because he didn't want to be there for his children but because he had no choice.

All of these people have died senseless deaths that could have been prevented. One day people will get tired of the hatred that occurs and decide to take a stand. I am one of those people. Soon I plan to start an anti-gang and anti-gun violence program at my school helping people learn to make better decisions. Until then, I participate in a mediation program. In this program we help teens who have problems with others learn to work out their differences and talk about them rather than fighting or killing each other for petty reasons. I know it's not much but I think it applies to this when Neil Armstrong said "That's one small step for man and one giant leap for mankind".
